LIVINGTHEWORD

- ❖ The writer of the Gospel of Luke is also understood to have written the Acts of the Apostles. In Acts, we learn of the unfolding events after Easter. The Feast of the Ascension is not trying to claim historically after 40 days Jesus 'ascended' but simply to reflect on his 'Ascension' and new presence now in Heaven. Jesus states a promise has been made by the 'Father' to send the Holy Spirit. Have you ever asked someone to make a 'promise'? Why? What does this reveal about Jesus and 'us'?
- The disciples are almost 'told off' by the Angels. 'Why are you looking up at the sky?' Instead of looking up, look around and get to work. The text also encourages a waiting for the Spirit and its power so that each disciple can 'witness'. Have you 'waited in prayer' calling for the gift and promise of the Holy Spirit? Consider how you could enter deeply into this prayer request leading to the celebration of Pentecost next week. Consider a place and time. The Spirit is often given through other people's prayer. Who could you ask?
- ❖ The letter to the Ephesians describes what the Spirit can bring about in us constantly in the life of the Church. What part of the prayer attracts your attention... wisdom, revelation, knowledge, enlighten, hope, call, glory, great might....? Why do you feel the attraction? What may this reveal about a possible prayer journey with the Holy Spirit leading to Pentecost?
- Putting things 'beneath his feet' is an ancient idea of authority and power. Kings and Queens were often raised to a height so that all who would come to visit would approach at the level of their feet. Consider Jesus having 'all power and authority'. Nothing is beyond the possibility of his doing. What would you often pray for knowing you can call upon this 'power'?
- Some disciples fell down and worshipped but others doubted. Matthew includes this acknowledgment of the persistent weakness and failure always present in the Church. Does this weakness of the disciples give you comfort or cause you to complain? In your journey of worship and doubt what has helped you remain a disciple? How could you help a 'doubter'?
- ❖ Jesus is not an absentee landlord. The Matthew text does not actually state Jesus has 'left'. There is still the struggle displacing the grip of Satan and completing the 'reign of God'. This is why he clothes his disciples with his power to continue in his work. How is Jesus present 'until the end of the age'? How do you continue 'his presence'?

In the last hours of his life, Jesus prays for his friends. Even though he bears in his heart and in his flesh all the sin of the world, Jesus continues to love us and pray for us. From his prayer, we learn how to deal with dramatic and painful moments. Let us think about one particular word that Jesus uses in his prayer to Father: it is the word "keep". In these days when your beloved country of Myanmar is experiencing violence, conflict and repression, let us ask ourselves: what we are being called to keep?

To keep the faith. Jesus does not resign himself to evil; he does not let himself be overwhelmed by grief; he does not retreat into the bitterness of the defeated and disappointed. Instead, he looks to heaven. To keep the faith is to keep our gaze lifted up to heaven, as here on earth, battles are fought and innocent blood is shed. To keep the faith is to refuse to yield to the logic of hatred and vengeance, but to keep our gaze fixed on the God of love, who calls us to be brothers and sisters to one another.

To keep unity. Jesus asks the Father to preserve the unity of his disciples, so that they may be "completely one" (*Jn* 17:21), one family in which love and fraternity reign. Division is a deadly disease. We experience it in our hearts, because we are divided within. We experience it in families and communities, among peoples, even in the Church. Sins against unity abound: envy, jealousy, the pursuit of personal interests rather than the common good, the tendency to judge others. Those little conflicts of ours find a reflection in great conflicts, like the one your country is experiencing in these days. We are called to keep unity, to be a family, to find the courage to live in friendship, love and fraternity. Each of you can make an effort to be, in little things, a builder of fraternity, someone who works to rebuild what is broken rather than fomenting violence. We are called to do this as Church. Let us promote dialogue, respect for others, care for our brothers and sisters, communion!

To keep the truth. Jesus asks the Father to consecrate his disciples in truth as they will be sent throughout the world to carry on his mission. Keeping the truth means remaining bound to Christ and being devoted to his Gospel. Truth, for the apostle John, is Christ himself, the revelation of the Father's love. Jesus prays that his disciples will not follow the criteria of this world. They are to keep their friendship with him; they are to preserve his message in its integrity. To keep the truth means to be a prophet in every situation in life, in other words, to be consecrated to the Gospel and bear witness to it.

Why should I be confirmed?

In baptism, God calls you to be a priest, prophet and king. In confirmation, you receive the gifts of the Holy Spirit to live out those vocations. A priest offers prayer and sacrifice. In confirmation, you are moved to make your everyday life a sacrifice that you join to the sacrifice of Christ on the cross (Romans 12:1). Prophet is from prophētēs, a Greek word meaning "spokesperson." In confirmation, you are compelled to preach the gospel (1 Corinthians 9:16), just as the apostles were when they received the Holy Spirit on the original day of Pentecost (Acts 2:2-4). When you were baptized, you were made a member of the royal family of God (1 Peter 2:9). Just as Jesus showed what it means to be a Servant King, so are we called to serve others in love. In confirmation, we are inspired by the love that God pours into us in his Holy Spirit (Romans 5:5).

In his first public preaching, Jesus quoted from Isaiah the prophet: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me" (Luke 4:18). That was the beginning of his public ministry. When the bishop anoints you with chrism, you can say the same. Your confirmation is the beginning of your own public ministry. •
