A FEW MORE WORDS FROM OUR 10 AM COMMUNITY PASTORAL LEADER, FR. JOHN P. MURRAY OSA

We are coming back to Matthew's Gospel – a re-introduction.

- 1) Matthew's community is a community of Jewish Christians at odds with their parent religion, being urged to trust that what has happened in Jesus is indeed the fulfilment of their hopes.
- 2) Their entire tradition is being re-read in the light of Jesus' life, death and resurrection.
- 3) In the person of Jesus, God has shown himself with them as the compassionate, faithful healer, calling them to live the challenge of the Good News of God's reign. "A life they never dared hope for".
- 4) Emmanuel God with us (1:23, 28:20)

Matthew challenges us to think again about our ideas of God and salvation. Matthew's focus on Jesus is an invitation to a faith relationship which leads to transformation – a new understanding of what it means to be human.

Reading Matthew challenges us to understand the idea of discipleship as being beyond adherence to commandments. It has to do with understanding that, in Jesus, God is with us and that as disciples our calling is to embrace the way of the Kingdom as shown by Jesus in word and deed.

In the Gospel of Matthew, the disciple is called to:

- Share a worldview (believing as Jesus believed)
- Live a relationship of faith with someone who is more than a teacher
- Community and Mission

Matthew's church is a community of disciples characterised by:

- Humility (18:1-5)
- Concern for the "little ones" (18:6-14)
- Reconciliation (18:15-20)
- Forgiveness and Mercy (18:21-34)

"For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." (18:20) Matthew's church is a small community on the margins. It is suspect because of claims in relation to a crucified rabbi. It is an idea of God and an ethic that speaks to those weighed down by Greco-Roman fatalism, decadence, or by the religious legalism of the parent faith.

Just offering some helpful thoughts from a Scripture Commentary by Sean Goan, to get us back into Matthew, on our re-entering Ordinary Sundays of the Year.



Ordinary Time in the Church Year

We have come through a rigorous cycle of the Church's year, having observed Lent, celebrated Easter, and then having rejoiced in the big three Sundays of Pentecost, Trinity and Corpus Christi. Now we re-enter Ordinary Time of the Church Year. What does this mean? Simply, Ordinary Time refers to the rest of the year.

One may then ask if any time is ordinary? After all, the extraordinary in our life and world can happen anytime. Actually, it can easily be said that every day is extraordinary in our chaotic world. So what sense do we make of Ordinary Time? I did a Google search and here is what I found.

"Ordinary Time is the season of the Church Year when we are encouraged to grow and mature in daily expression of our faith outside the great seasons of celebration of Christmas and Easter and the great periods of penance of Advent and Lent.

Ordinary Time is a time to deepen one's prayer life, read the Scriptures, unite more deeply with the Lord in the Eucharist, and become a more holy and whole person.

Ordinary Time is a period when average people like you and me strive to become the extraordinary messengers of the Gospel that we have been commissioned to be through our baptism.

Ordinary Time is this day, this moment. Now."

No time is really ordinary in terms of being routine, normal or boring. With the pandemic, we can easily ask – What is normal? We live in times when the abnormal is more the normal. I think we name that as the "new normal", which keeps changing into ever newer normals. No, this is not what Ordinary Time in the Church's liturgical calendar means. Rather it "means ordered, or numbered, time and is derived from ordinal numbers (eg, 1st)".

In terms of being boring or routine, no time is ordinary. All time is the acceptable time. As St Paul says, "Now is the acceptable time; now is the day of salvation!" (2 Cor 6: 2). We are called to live in the present, in the now, and experience God and life in the midst of reality. The Kingdom of God is here and now. The Mystery of God is alive and real in our midst.

So let us pray the prayer of St John Henry Newman, in the hope that we may live life to the full.

May Christ support us all the day long,
Till the shades lengthen, and the evening comes,
And the busy world is hushed, and the fever of life is over, and our work is done!
Then, with mercy, may God give us safe lodging, a holy rest, and peace at the last!

Is there a right to health care? As a Catholic, what kind of obligation do I have to use my resources to help with the purchase of medicine for my brother? His insurance won't cover the costs, and he's on a fixed income.

Saint John XXIII's 1963 encyclical Pacem In Terris (Peace on Earth) said people have a right to live and a right to the "means necessary for the proper development of life" (11). This text serves as a foundation for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' speaking of a right to "basic" or "adequate health care" in their Ethical and Religious Directives for Catholics. What is not clear in Church teaching is who has the duty to ensure that right. In some cases, the state has taken this responsibility, but this need not be the case. The condition of millions of our brothers and sisters in Christ, however, urges us to action on their behalf.

Regarding the case of one's brother, the question is difficult because of the need for more information. What is the brother's prognosis? Is he taking care of himself responsibly? What do you feel capable of doing morally without placing yourself and others in your care at risk?

Whatever one's ability to respond in this case, one's relationship with one's brother should be marked by compassion and a sincere desire and will to help in whatever way is morally reasonable.
