# LIVINGTHEWORD

- ❖ The month of November begins by celebrating All Saints (Nov 1st) and All Souls (Nov 2nd). Be invited to visit a church to pray, in thanks for all those who have brightened our journey with their lives.
- ❖ The Book of Wisdom was written to share the beauty of Jewish 'wisdom', which was different from Greek 'wisdom'. For Greeks, wisdom was the result of intensive human study and work. Jewish people understood wisdom as a feminine aspect of God and a gift 'received'. At dawn was the favoured time for prayer. During the day 'the gate' was a place of gathering for elders making legal decisions and where city trade took place. Do you love, seek, watch, pray into the night for wisdom? v17 continues: wisdom begins with the sincere desire for instruction. What would you like 'instruction' in? Who could you ask for help?
- ❖ Paul's letter to the Thessalonians is one of the earliest letters in the New Testament. In contrast to the belief that death was the very end, our Christian faith rests on a certain hope. Use your imagination to enter Paul's picture of the final day. Why do you think scripture refers to this as a 'great and terrible' day?
- ❖ In the ancient Middle East, the complete wedding celebration would take up several days. The first stage involved the fathers of the couple discussing and arranging the contract and legal matters between the two families. The groom would then arrive to the bride's house to take her home. It was not known how long the various discussions would take. Guests at the groom's house were frequently 'waiting' as a result of delays. You can imagine the surprise with the groom and bride arriving at midnight! Jesus uses this image for his 'return'. The Church celebrates the Feast of Christ the King (November 20) as if it were the 'return'. What would you do if Jesus returned in 2 weeks?
- ❖ The bridesmaids and 'oil for their lamps' is symbolic of 'being ready'. 'Oil' equals readiness. It cannot be 'shared'. Spiritual preparation cannot be done by someone else. There is the striking image of a 'locked door'. Cries to 'open the door'. A negative response. The parable draws us in. We are left with self-accusation: will I be 'ready'? In what way does this parable challenge you?

Mission is about church being church. It impinges on core questions and challenges regarding the identity and active life of the Church in our world which is seeing the impact of Covid-19, rising poverty and social inequalities, the dangers of climate change and rising occurrences of war and conflict. Within such a world scenario, we are facing a rising new order within which Church exists and functions.

This new order is seen in the changing face of the Church, going through Synod, and engaging a fractured world, based on a stance defined by questioning, compassion and solidarity. This calls Church to basic self-criticism of how to operate in our world. This is not a new theme, but one reflected in the calling and living out of the Second Vatican Council. It is not about questioning doctrine but allowing Church to develop so as to live what we believe more efficaciously.

In the midst of life's struggles and strivings, I have become aware that I am caught in a Pauline paradox. On one side, I identify my need for self-transformation as I am weak and sinful, which I too seldom acknowledge about myself, while I am ever out there, criticising and analysing the world. On the other side, our world truly does need transformation as so much is going wrong. It, therefore, rightfully becomes a focus for critical debate, but don't let this lead to self-indulgent discussions. Rather let concerted action, based on the Gospel, arise out of our prayer and reflection, to help build the Kingdom of God here and now. That is our Christian mission.

So what is the answer to this paradox? It lies both with *in* self and with *out*. The answer is mission – mission to self and to others. St Teresa of Avila had it right in her approach. You go with *in* so as to go *out*. Life is neither a political campaign nor a self-help trip. It is an adventure to be lived and shared, a gift from God to all, from which all benefit and in which all participate, encountering the one true God and humanity, through those we encounter along the way and reach out to in love.

As I have been recently quoted – the cry of life is to engage in "active participation". God bless.

# Dear Padre

November 12, 2023

I was taught that Catholic churches are built on consecrated ground. How can a church be torn down and replaced by a shopping mall if it's sacred ground?

Church buildings are blessed and considered by the Church to be sacred places. But when they're damaged and can no longer be repaired or their repair is impractical or they no longer effectively serve their purpose for the faithful of God, the bishop can remove that blessing. By doing this, the bishop opens them for nonsacred use. Subsequently, they can be torn down or sold, as long as the new purpose is not scandalous to the people of God.

In the end, what is truly sacred is not the brick and mortar or even the soil, but the purpose for which they were built. Churches are blessed and declared sacred because we perform sacred rituals within them. When those rituals are no longer being performed in that location, there is no longer a need for them to be declared sacred.

When a church is closed, it is often a sad event. Many people carry deep emotional ties to their parish churches. But a diocese cannot always maintain all of its churches. Catholic populations shift, local needs change. Money is limited, and good stewardship demands that bishops sometimes make the difficult decision to close or merge parishes. Remember what is truly important and of ultimate and sacred value—our worship and service of God.
