LIVINGTHEWORD

- The Book of Proverbs is a collection of wise sayings for daily living. Today a woman – not necessarily exceptional or beautiful as modern media might portray her – does routine daily chores filled with wisdom and purpose. Her love extends beyond her family to the poor and needy. Her life and good works are spoken of 'at the city gates'. Have you experienced 'charm' as deceptive and 'beauty' fleeting? Two quite different lifestyles are presented as a 'mirror' to expose the reader. Where do you 'see' yourself?
- Paul's letter to the Thessalonians is the earliest New Testament Letter. They were concerned that 'the Day of the Lord' (Jesus' return) had not happened. St Paul shares with them and us that the exact date of the 'Day of the Lord' is not known. But we are all to be 'living in the light', following the way of Jesus. What image speaks more to you: not sleeping, staying alert, being sober? How could you apply this 'image' to an application in your life?
- The end of the Church's Year is coming! Next week is the final Sunday of the current liturgical year, when we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King. The Judgment Parable of the Talents is given to us today as a way of helping us to reflect seriously on the end of the world and the Lord's Second Coming. A careful reading of the Parable reveals some disturbing realities –
 - One 'talent' is a large weight of metal equivalent to 15 years of an average wage (\$750,000!). Is the Master generous or mean? What image of God do you read into the text?
 - Two different 'images' and perceptions of the Master are found. Servants 1 and 2 are spurred into creativity, while servant 3 is filled with fear. He will take no risks, avoid any wrongdoing, and will give back to God *'in strict justice'* what was given. Is servant 3 selfish? His fear of judgment tends to paralyse him. He is not filled with a freedom and love for creative risk-taking in works of mercy. Could this be an image of the Jewish community for Matthew? The Christian Community today?
- Very large amounts of money are being traded. Is this supporting capitalist greed and risk-taking or is it reduced to a 'small matter' in comparison to the new 'great responsibilities' of the Kingdom of God?
- Reflect personally and name your 'talents'. From this parable what do you think God asks of you? If you were to be judged on your current use of your talents what might be the conclusion?

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Message of Pope Francis for 2023 World Day of the Poor – 19 November 2023

"Do not turn your face away from anyone who is poor" (Tob 4:7). These words help us to understand the essence of our witness. A father, Tobit, embraces his son, Tobias, who is about to set out on a lengthy journey. The elderly Tobit fears that he will never again see his son, and so leaves him his "spiritual testament". Tobit had been deported to Nineveh and is now blind, and thus doubly poor. At the same time, he remains always certain of one thing, expressed by his very name: *"The Lord has been my good"*. As a God-fearing man and a good father, he wants to leave his son the witness of the right path to follow in life. He speaks of carrying out good works and practising justice. Faith teaches us to go more deeply.

That of Tobit is a remarkable story. Despite being such a good man, he was put to the test. As Scripture often teaches us, God does not spare trials to those who are righteous. Why? It is not to disgrace us, but to strengthen our faith in Him. Tobit, in his time of trial, discovers his own poverty, which enables him to recognise others who are poor. He is faithful to God's law and keeps the commandments, but for him this is not enough. He can show practical concern for the poor because he has personally known what it is to be poor.

Everyone is our neighbour. If I myself am poor, I can recognise my brothers or sisters in need of my help. We are called to acknowledge every poor person and every form of poverty, abandoning the indifference and the banal excuses we make to protect our illusory wellbeing.

On this 60th anniversary of the Encyclical 'Pacem in Terris', we do well to take to heart the following words of Pope Saint John XXIII: "Every human being enjoys the right to life, to bodily integrity and to the means necessary for the proper development of life". I think in particular of peoples caught up in situations of war. We should never grow accustomed to such situations. Let us persevere in every effort to foster peace as a gift of the Risen Lord and the fruit of a commitment to justice and dialogue.

The poor are persons; they have faces, stories, hearts and souls. They are our brothers and sisters, and it is important to enter into a personal relation with each of them. This requires us to seek out and find one another. Caring for the poor calls for reestablishing the just interpersonal relationships that poverty harms. What the poor need is certainly our humanity, our hearts open to love. Let us never forget that *"we are called to find Christ in them, to lend our voice to their causes, but also to be their friends"* (Evangelii Gaudium). Faith teaches us also that every poor person is a son or daughter of God.

My grandmother says Catholics used to fast from midnight until they received Communion. When did the fasting time change to only one hour, and why?

The ancient discipline of fasting before Communion became a universal practice by the fifth century. Until 1953, those who would receive holy Communion refrained from consuming food, water, and medicine from midnight to the time of Communion. In 1953 and 1957, Pope Pius XII reduced the fast from food to three hours and from water for one hour (*Christus Dominus* and *Sacram Communionem*).

In 1966, Pope St. Paul VI further reduced the fast to one hour and allowed water and medicine at any time (*Paenitemini*). In 1973, he reduced the fast for the sick and elderly to fifteen minutes before Communion when one hour is prohibitive (*Immensae Caritatis*).

The loosening of the restrictions was in no way intended to lessen the reverence for the holy Eucharist. The changes were made to allow as many Catholics as possible to receive the Eucharist, which can be difficult when priests are in short supply. For the same reason, *Immensae Caritatis* also allowed the practice of having extraordinary ministers give Communion. Despite the changes to the Communion fast, unity and uniformity have been maintained. And of course, Catholics are free to fast before Communion beyond the duration and degree currently prescribed. ●
