LIVINGTHEWORD

- ❖ The Book of Deuteronomy is a book of long sermons and reflections. It is regarded as the second law ('deutero', from the Greek 'deuteros', meaning 'second'), an insightful reflection on the teachings of Moses. Although considered the 'Great Prophet', Moses did not lead God's people into the Promised Land. Yet the community realised how necessary it was to have someone completely 'in tune' with God who could correct and guide them. Are you frightened to 'hear the voice of God'? Do you resist 'being still' and listening to the deepest voice of God within your spirit? Is there a 'prophet' that God has placed in your life and you know it is important to 'listen to the words of their mouth'?
- ❖ A true prophet speaks what God has spoken. It is not made up wisdom. Have you 'presumed to speak in my name'? Consider praying to God for particular wisdom and insight for people whom you guide with your words and witness. Do any images, words or ideas come to mind? Write them down and continue to ask God for guidance.
- St Paul's writings teach of equality of men and women in marriage. Putting the Letter to the Corinthians in context, Paul's early writings presume Jesus' return is to happen so soon that it is best to let nothing distract us from being ready. What makes you anxious? Distracted from God?
- ❖ The Gospel of Mark immediately shows Jesus overcoming the forces of Evil. Check out a typical day of Jesus in Mark chapters 1-3! The battle between Good and Evil is striking. Unclean spirits are taunted and afraid and, surprisingly, acknowledge Jesus' identity before anyone else. Jesus is experienced differently from the scribes who taught legal rules. Jesus, in his words and actions, brought healing and liberation. Are you a person of 'word' and 'action'? Is your word filled with commitment to bring about what you have said?
- Exorcisms done by Jesus symbolise and reveal the ultimate struggle between Good and Evil that Jesus is involved with. To bring the Kingdom of God into reality involves 'fighting against evil'. Is there anything that you are doing in your life that Jesus would not do? If Jesus were to be in your home or workplace, what would he resist? Fight? Seek to change?
- ❖ Jesus is shown to be the true prophet, fulfilling the prophecy of Moses (first reading), whose word is the Word of God. Yet he breaks the Sabbath Law by 'working a healing'. He does this in the synagogue, in front of the scribes (Church leaders who teach the Law). He creates a disturbance, with the man convulsing and shaking in front of a crowd as he is released from domination by an evil spirit. Jesus as a prophet makes people uncomfortable. 'Prophets make lovely additions to the Bible, but you certainly don't want one in your neighbourhood. No Sir! Prophets wreak havoc on the status quo...' Can you identify anyone who is prophetic? Whose presence brings God into your life, and causes havoc in re-establishing God's Order? What prophetic word or act could you do this week?

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POPE FRANCIS' ADDRESS TO THE HOLY SEE'S DIPLOMATIC CORPS

At the start of every year, the Pope, as Head of State, addresses the Diplomatic Corps accredited to the Holy See. For 2024, this happened on 8th January. Each year, I read this address of Pope Francis and I never cease to be impressed. It is like a Presidential Address on the "State of The World". Therefore, over this Sunday and next, I share some of the Pope's address, as it is both enlightening and hopeful, both of which our world needs – Enlightenment and Hope.

The path to peace calls for respect for life, for every human life, starting with the life of the unborn child in the mother's womb, which cannot be suppressed or turned into an object of trafficking. In this regard, I deem deplorable the practice of so-called surrogate motherhood, which represents a grave violation of the dignity of the woman and the child, based on the exploitation of situations of the mother's material needs. A child is always a gift and never the basis of a commercial contract. I note with regret, especially in the West, the continued spread of a culture of death, which in the name of a false compassion discards children, the elderly and the sick. The path to peace calls for respect for human rights, in accordance with the simple yet clear formulation contained in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. These principles are self-evident and commonly accepted.

Dialogue, on the other hand, must be the soul of the international community. The current situation is also the result of the weakening of structures of multilateral diplomacy that arose after the Second World War. Organisations established to foster security, peace and cooperation are no longer capable of uniting all their members around one table. There is the risk of a "monadology" and of splitting into "clubs" that only admit states deemed ideologically compatible. Even agencies devoted to the common good and to technical questions, which have thus far proved effective, risk paralysis due to ideological polarisation and exploitation by individual states. To be sure, dialogue requires patience, perseverance and an ability to listen, yet when sincere attempts are made to put an end to disagreements, significant results can be achieved. The way to peace is through political and social dialogue.

The path to peace also passes through interreligious dialogue, which before all else requires the protection of religious freedom and respect for minorities. It is painful to note that an increasing number of countries are adopting models of centralised control over religious freedom, especially by the massive use of technology. In other places, minority religious communities often find themselves in increasingly precarious situations.

Why is the Old Testament part of Christian worship? Parts of the Old Testament seem to be opposed to the teachings of Christ.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church says it best: "The Old Testament is an indispensable part of Sacred Scripture. Its books are divinely inspired and retain a permanent value, for the Old Covenant has never been revoked" (CCC 121).

The Old Testament, also referred to as the Hebrew Scriptures, is the only Bible Jesus ever knew. That is an important reason to try to understand these Scriptures. The Pentateuch (first five books), the prophets, the Book of Psalms, and the wisdom writings all had a profound impact on Jesus. His image of God as Father, his preaching, his parables, and his proclamation of the reign of God were all influenced by the Hebrew Scriptures.

It is true that Jesus' preaching also goes beyond the Old Testament. At times he substitutes what the law has to say with an even more demanding requirement (see, for example, the Sermon on the Mount). In general, however, the Old Testament forms a context for understanding what Jesus was doing. His passion and death made no sense to his first followers except in light of the Suffering Servant of the Old Testament (Isaiah 52:13—53:12). There are many more examples like this one. Thus, the *Catechism* says "the Old Testament bears witness to the whole divine pedagogy of God's saving love" (*CCC* 122). ●
