LIVINGTHEWORD

- The Church celebrates 'Good Shepherd Sunday' today. It is an opportunity to consider service of Christ in the Church for the World, through a vocation in single life, married life, priesthood or religious life. Can you think of people who are good examples for you of each vocation? Spend time in prayer praying for each one.
- Vocation means 'call'. St Ignatius teaches us that: "God writes his hopes into our deepest desires". What does that mean God may be calling you to? Imagine the highs and lows of each vocation what attracts you? What desire is strongest? Are you willing to follow it?
- Laying down one's life for the sheep' is contrasted with being a hired man who works for pay and has no concern for the sheep. What do you think is the difference between Vocation and Career? Does one 'lead down' and the other attempt 'climbing up'?
- St Peter shares a building image. Very large stones were measured and cut to 'fit' and be suitable for building upon. Is your life truly 'built upon' Jesus or is it merely 'looking at' Jesus? Does your lifestyle show you are *God's child...*?
- One of the actions done by a good shepherd is to 'lie down' in the 'gateway' of a small, low fenced circle of stones to care for the sheep and protect them from harm. The good shepherd was willing to fight to the death any wolf seeking to harm the sheep. It was an expectation that a child who was looking after the sheep, if attacked, was to show evidence of scratches or wolf fur to the family. Are you willing to fight and protect God's family? Seek out the lost who have strayed? Stand attentive to warn of dangerous influences?
- Laying down one's life' is another scriptural picture of the way Jesus laid down his life on the cross as the good shepherd. Laying down and enduring a sleep-shortened night is something parents do for love of their children. Knowing sheep by name, sharing each day and providing nourishment and shelter. Can you see similarities between parenthood and priesthood? Does 'laying down your life' appeal to you or frighten you? Does love lead you, or does fear fill you?
- 'No one takes it from me, I lay it down on my own'. A vocation is something freely chosen. We 'hear' the call of God through desire and attraction; we give ourselves to walk the journey of discovery and we 'take up' what is involved, in faithfulness to our personal calling. 'Fear ... I'm not good enough ... I feel stuck ... I don't know ... ' are all human responses. 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Pope Francis' Teaching on the Liturgy – Desiderio Desideravi (continued)

Let us return to the cenacle in Jerusalem. On the morning of Pentecost the Church is born, the initial cell of the new humanity. Only the community of men and women — reconciled because pardoned, alive because He is alive, true because dwelt in by the Spirit of Truth — can open the cramped space of spiritual individualism.

It is the community of Pentecost that is able to break the Bread in the certain knowledge that the Lord is alive, risen from the dead, present with his Word, with his gestures, with the offering of His Body and His Blood. From that moment on the celebration became the privileged place — though not the only one — of an encounter with Him. We know that only thanks to the grace of this encounter does a human being become fully human. Only the Church of Pentecost can conceive of the human being as a person, open to a full relationship with God, with creation, and with one's brothers and sisters.

In this is posed the decisive question of liturgical formation. Romano Guardini says, "Here too the first practical task is indicated: carried along by this inner transformation of our time, we must learn anew how to relate religiously as fully human beings." This is what the Liturgy makes possible.

Liturgy is about praise, about rendering thanks for the Passover of the Son whose power reaches our lives. The celebration concerns the reality of our being docile to the action of the Spirit, who operates through it until Christ be formed in us. (Cf. Gal 4:19) The full extent of our formation is our conformation to Christ. I repeat: it does not have to do with an abstract mental process, but with becoming Him. This is the purpose for which the Spirit is given, whose action is always and only to confect the Body of Christ. It is that way with the Eucharistic bread, and with every one of the baptised called to become always more and more that which was received as a gift in Baptism; namely, being a member of the Body of Christ. Leo the Great writes, "Our participation in the Body and Blood of Christ has no other end than to make us become that which we eat."

I cannot think of any more relevant sharing for this Sunday, as we reflect on the transformative power of our Easter faith and commission today two new Extraordinary Lay Ministers of the Eucharist for our community. Through Jesus' resurrection, we are called to participate in a mystery, which is simply mind-blowing, for Jesus' resurrection is our resurrection, our entry into the new humanity, the new creation, destined for all humanity, by our loving God.

My son was raised Catholic and still claims he is Catholic, but he and his wife go to a Protestant church. How should I deal with my frustration?

Many parents and grandparents today share your frustration. They raised their children Catholic, maybe even sent them to Catholic schools, but the children have grown up and chosen not to continue to be faithful Catholics. A recent survey showed that nine out of ten people say they believe in God, but often they are not committed to a single religion or house of worship. About half of the people questioned attend religious services less than once a month, or never. The loyalty to one Church that was evident in our own lives, or in our parents' and grandparents' lives, is lacking in today's people under age fifty-five.

What can one do about this situation? Certainly pray for your children and continue to give a good example through your own loyalty to the Catholic Church and attendance at Sunday Mass. Invite your son and his wife to attend with you when they visit. As your children age, they may become more interested in your family's history and traditions, and the religion of their childhood may again appear attractive. Try to be patient and continue to pray that your children will return to the Church of their roots.
