LIVINGTHEWORD

- ❖ The Prophet Isaiah is with God's people in Exile in Babylon. He makes a prophecy of a great leader who will not be like any leader ever known. God will allow his life to be crushed, which will 'ransom' and 'justify' (make right) all people. Verses like this in Isaiah form the '4 songs of the suffering servant'. Christians understand these texts as teaching us about Jesus' suffering. Have you experienced anyone willing to suffer for you? Can you think of any story where someone restored friendship with another at great cost? What happened? How does this help you make sense of Jesus' suffering for you?
- ❖ The Letter to the Hebrews continues to explain how Jesus' death and Resurrection have replaced the Jewish High Priest in the Temple. Instead of 'walking through the curtain' that separated people in the Temple from the sacred place the 'Holy of Holies' (God's presence) Jesus' death allows him to 'pass into heaven'. Instead of the High Priest sprinkling blood on the 'Mercy Seat' inside the Holy of Holies to bring forgiveness, Jesus on the cross has become the 'throne of grace' the new revelation of God's Mercy. Where do you go to, look at, feel, the mercy and forgiveness of God? Consider praying with a crucifix this week, or at church in front of the Tabernacle to 'find grace'.
- ❖ Jesus has just finished his third prediction of his suffering and death (Mk 10:32). The immediate request of James and John, for positions of power, reveal they do not yet understand what Jesus' death means. The indignation of the others reveals they were all secretly seeking power and glory. The Kingdom of God and the Messiah (to bring the Kingdom about) is still thought of as a strong political and military figure, and a triumphant banquet and honours will be given when victory is won. And, like other rulers, power will then be exercised as authority over them. Such a mindset will breed continual violence. How do you view violence and war? Do you secretly wish leaders would use power over others? Do you think the way of non-violence works?
- ❖ 'Drink the cup' and 'baptism' are terms full of meaning. The Father of the house would fill the cup of each member of the home. It was descriptive of God the Father giving out the plan / lot which was assigned to each person. It symbolised God's will. Baptism was not so much a water baptism as an immersion into the will of God − often involving some struggle and pain. Jesus is sharing with his disciples that the cup (job) is to set people free from the grip of sin and bondage, and Satan. This is a task which will involve hardship and suffering. What does 'drink the cup' and 'baptism' mean for your life? Now? Does it cost you anything?
- ❖ Jesus teaches about leadership. He uses some colourful images: servant / slave; humble service at a meal rather than a position of glory and being waited on, hand and foot. Ransom: in Jewish culture a person in debt or enslaved could be 'ransomed' back. Like a special family object in a pawn shop that is to be recovered and returned to the family. In religious worship it was also understood as an 'atonement' (at-one-ment), offering to bring forgiveness and a re-union with God. How do you understand and exercise leadership? Have you ever actively said NO to power? Pride? Greed?

Let us now be guided by some of the teachings from the 38 "Catecheses on Prayer" that Pope Francis gave between May 2020 and June 2021:

"Prayer is the first strength of hope. You pray and hope grows, it moves forward. I would say that prayer opens the door to hope. There is hope, but I open the door with my prayer." (General Audience, May 20, 2020)

"Jesus' prayer is the place where we perceive that everything comes from God and returns to him. Sometimes we, human beings, believe that we are the masters of everything or, on the contrary, we lose all self-esteem; we go from one extreme to the other. Prayer helps us to find the right dimension in our relationship with God, our Father, and with all Creation." (General Audience, November 4, 2020)

"Through prayer a new incarnation of the Word takes place. And we are the "tabernacles" where the words of God seek to be welcomed and preserved, so that they may visit the world [...]. Through prayer, the Word of God comes to abide in us and we abide in it. The Word inspires good intentions and sustains action; it gives us strength and serenity, and even when it challenges us, it gives us peace." (General Audience, 27 January, 2021)

"Everything in the Church originates in prayer and everything grows thanks to prayer. When the Enemy, the Evil One, wants to fight the Church, he does so first by trying to drain her fonts, preventing her from praying [...]. Prayer is what opens the door to the Holy Spirit, who inspires progress. Changes in the Church without prayer are not changes made by the Church. They are changes made by groups." (General Audience, April 14, 2021)

"Jesus not only wants us to pray as he prays, but assures us that, even if our attempts at prayer are completely vain and ineffective, we can always count on his prayer. We must be aware of this: Jesus prays for me." (General Audience, June 2, 2021)

I read about bishops with different titles: coadjutor, auxiliary, ordinary. What is the difference between all of these bishops?

All bishops in the Church are ordained in the same way. Bishops are the only people who can ordain other people in the Church. Bishops also have authority regarding Church matters. A bishop who is the *ordinary* of a diocese is the head of that diocese. He has the authority to guide and direct matters in the diocese. Like all other bishops, he has the responsibility to teach and preach in the name of the Church.

A bishop who is an *auxiliary* is assigned to help the ordinary of the diocese. His responsibilities are given to him by the ordinary. In most circumstances, the auxiliary will help in the administration of the diocese and celebrate the sacraments within the diocese.

A coadjutor bishop is assigned to aid the ordinary of the diocese. He usually has the right to succeed the ordinary once he retires or dies in office. In some circumstances, coadjutor bishops may be given authority that is normally reserved to the ordinary.

The differences between these bishops are the tasks they perform and the authority they have within a diocese. However, as bishops, they all receive the same ordination. •
