<u>SOLEMNITY OF ALL SAINTS</u> — Some thoughts from Fr Kieran O'Mahony osa

There are twenty-seven Beatitudes in the New Testament. The first is in Matthew 5:1 and the last is in Rev 22:14. The Beatitudes in Matthew are to be interpreted within the Sermon on the Mount and alongside the corresponding narrative section (Chapters 8-9).

Matthew leaves out the woes of Luke, but he has his own dire warnings. In rhetorical terms, this text is an introduction, designed to get the attention, good will and receptivity of the hearers. It achieves these aims (a) by awakening a desire for happiness; (b) by naming the present situation and (c) by proposing attitudes and actions that lead to salvation in heaven.

Matthew's Beatitudes are chiefly apocalyptic, promising end-time reversal. They thus reveal a difficult situation in his community, perhaps as a result of the – probably recent – break with the mother faith of Judaism. In this Gospel, there are nine Beatitudes, in a significant order:

- 1-4 → passive Beatitudes
- 5-8 → active Beatitudes (with 8 as a bridge to 9)
- 9 → Beatitude on persecution

Beatitude 8 is from Matthew's own source. Cf. 1 Pet 3:14: "But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you." (1 Pet 3:14-15)

Today we celebrate the community of faith, being in communion with all the Saints, a day of both thanksgiving and vision. **Thanksgiving** because of the example and inspiration of the Saints, who have come to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ (*Eph 4:13*). **Vision** because our Gospel today describes the path we must take to make the same journey home to God. If we wish to join the Saints both now and into eternity, we must make our own "mission statement" of Jesus – which is the Sermon on the Mount – and especially the opening invitation to true happiness.

Prayer

Jesus you are our teacher within and today we ask your help. Just as you have brought our brothers and sisters to full maturity in you, so also guide us and be with us as we walk your Way. By your grace, may we too be counted among saints in the present moment and in the life to come. Amen.

Continuing a look at Chapter 4 of Pope Francis' Encyclical "Amoris Laetitia" (2016), where he considers love through the eyes of St Paul, in 1 Corinthians 13:4-7

Love is at the service of others (93-94)

The next word that Paul uses is *chrestéuetai*. The word is used only here in the entire Bible. It is derived from *chrestós*: a good person, one who shows his goodness by his deeds. Here, in strict parallelism with the preceding verb, it serves as a complement. Paul wants to make it clear that "patience" is not a completely passive attitude, but one accompanied by activity, by a dynamic and creative interaction with others. The word indicates that love benefits and helps others. For this reason, it is translated as "kind"; love is ever ready to be of assistance.

Throughout the text, it is clear that Paul wants to stress that love is more than a mere feeling. Rather, it should be understood along the lines of the Hebrew verb "to love": it is "to do good". As Saint Ignatius of Loyola said, "Love is shown more by deeds than by words". It thus shows its fruitfulness and allows us to experience the happiness of giving, the nobility and grandeur of spending ourselves unstintingly, without asking to be repaid, purely for the pleasure of giving and serving.

Love is not jealous (95-96)

Saint Paul goes on to reject as contrary to love an attitude expressed by the verb $zel\acute{o}i$ – to be jealous or envious. This means that love has no room for discomfiture at another's good fortune. Envy is a form of sadness provoked by another's prosperity; it shows that we are not concerned for the happiness of others but only with our own well-being. Whereas love makes us rise above ourselves, envy closes us in on ourselves. True love values the other person's achievements. It does not see him or her as a threat. It frees us from the sour taste of envy. It recognises that everyone has different gifts and a unique path in life. So it strives to discover its own road to happiness, while allowing others to find theirs.

Love inspires a sincere esteem for every human being and the recognition of his or her own right to happiness. I love this person, and I see him or her with the eyes of God, who gives us everything "for our enjoyment" (1 Tim 6:17). As a result, I feel a deep sense of happiness and peace. This same deeply rooted love also leads me to reject the injustice whereby some possess too much and others too little. It moves me to find ways of helping society's outcasts to find a modicum of joy. That is not envy, but the desire for equality.

Do saints ever smile? That question comes to me every year on the feast of All Saints (November 1) as I look at the pictures and statues in church. The faces are so somber and serious. What are the saints really like?

Artists through the centuries may have portrayed sanctity in very subdued tones. The saints, however, and their biographers tell a different story. The holy men and women who make up the communion of saints are an incredibly fascinating array of diverse personalities. The feast of All Saints celebrates our universal call to holiness. Our challenge is to imitate the characteristics these unique individuals have in common.

Saint Irenaeus (125–202) said that the glory of God is the human fully alive which reflects Jesus' own words, "I came so that they may have life; and have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). Saints enjoy life! The nearsighted St. Alphonsus Liquori (1696-1787), founder of the Redemptorists, sat in the back row of the Naples theater with his alasses off so he could enjoy the music he loved without the distraction of the half-naked chorus line. Saint Teresa of Ávila (1515–1582), caught devouring partridge in the convent kitchen, said, "When I pray, I pray; when I eat partridge, I eat partridge!" Saint Joan of Arc (1412-1431) loved horses, and St. Charles Borromeo (1538-1584) loved chess. Indeed, saints do smile. They even laugh.
