LIVINGTHEWORD

- Isaiah shares his vocation call from God. His response of feeling unworthy 'I have unclean lips', God's healing response 'your sin is purged', followed by Isaiah's second response 'Here I am, send me!'. Call ... resistance ... healing ... acceptance, is the common pattern of vocation. What is your personal vocation story and what 'stage' are you at? What fear would have to be dissolved before you could genuinely say to God 'Here I am, send me!'?
- St Paul is writing to the Corinthian community, which was beginning to practise a 'selective' Christianity. They discarded teachings which they did not like. Some could not accept the teaching of the Resurrection because they thought matter was evil and spirit was good. They are reminded that Christian teaching can be traced back to Jesus from the Scriptures and from the Apostles and Paul himself is faithful to their teaching. Are there elements of the Church's teaching which you want to be 'selective' about? Who could you talk with to find out more about the 'why' of the Church's teaching?
- Paul says of himself that he was 'abnormally born'. It took a while for Paul to be able
 to meet and share faith with the Apostles. They were possibly afraid of him he did
 persecute Christians! and he was a little apprehensive if he and his teachings
 would be accepted. Have you wanted to share your faith journey with a friend or
 spiritual director? Studies have shown people who share their faith grow more deeply
 in their discipleship journey. Who would you be willing to share it with?
- Simon was using 'reasonable thinking' suggesting to Jesus that it was not a good idea to go fishing. He had plenty of evidence that it wasn't going to work. But he moved beyond 'reason' to 'risk'. 'At your command I will lower the nets'. Is there a word, experience, invitation from God recently which you need to be obedient to? What is the fear that stops you from taking a risk?
- Isaiah, St Paul and Peter all share their human experience of frailty, guilt and unworthiness. Paul even refers to his feeling 'abnormally born'! God uses this painful self-awareness positively, and it is important to notice that God is not afraid of our human weakness. In God's eyes, only those who have tasted personal frailty are ready for pastoral leadership. "Do not be afraid!" Consider what it would be like to live and make decisions not based in fear. What would you do? How would you live?
- In the Greek, the text hints at 'catching people alive'. The special use of words points to catching people to lead them into the fullest life. Do you consider leading people to Jesus as joyful and life-giving? Do you presume people will come to you rather than having to go to them in the 'deep water'? Where is the 'deep water' for you at the moment?
- Luke inserts a particular word more than the other Gospel writers. 'Everything'. He will repeat this word 8 times. What would it mean for you to let go of 'everything' so that you are free to 'follow him'?

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DILEXIT NOS — Encyclical of Pope Francis (2024): On Human and Divine Love of the Heart of Jesus.

"He loved us", Saint Paul says of Christ (cf. Rom 8:37), in order to make us realise that nothing can ever "separate us" from that love (Rom 8:39). Paul could say this with certainty because Jesus himself had told his disciples, "I have loved you" (Jn 15:9, 12). Even now, the Lord says to us, "I have called you friends" (Jn 15:15). His open heart has gone before us and waits for us, unconditionally, asking only to offer us his love and friendship. For "he loved us first" (cf. 1 Jn 4:10). Because of Jesus, "we have come to know and believe in the love that God has for us" (1 Jn 4:16).

<u>Chapter One — The Importance of the Heart</u>

The symbol of the heart has often been used to express the love of Jesus Christ. Living as we do in an age of superficiality, rushing frenetically from one thing to another without really knowing why, and ending up as insatiable consumers and slaves to the mechanisms of a market unconcerned about the deeper meaning of our lives, all of us need to rediscover the importance of the heart.

What do we mean by "the heart"?

In classical Greek, the word denotes the inmost part of human beings. For Homer, it indicates not only the centre of the body, but also the human soul and spirit. In the Iliad, thoughts and feelings proceed from the heart and are closely bound one to another. The heart appears as the locus of desire and the place where important decisions take shape. From ancient times, there has been an appreciation that human beings are a unity of body and soul, with a coordinating centre that provides a backdrop of meaning and direction to all that a person experiences.

The Bible tells us that, "the Word of God is living and active ... it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart" (Heb 4:12). It speaks to us of the heart as a core that lies hidden beneath all outward appearances. The disciples of Emmaus, on their mysterious journey in the company of the risen Christ, experienced a moment of anguish, confusion, despair and disappointment. Yet beyond and in spite of this, something was happening deep within them: "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road?" (Lk 24:32).

The heart is the locus of sincerity, where deceit and disguise have no place. It usually indicates our true intentions, what we really think, believe and desire. It is the part of us that is authentic, real, entirely "who we are". Instead of running after superficial satisfactions and playing a role for the benefit of others, we would do better to think about the really important questions in life.

Who am I, really? What am I looking for? What direction do I want to give to my life, my decisions and my actions? Why and for what purpose am I in this world? How do I want to look back on my life once it ends? What meaning do I want to give to all my experiences? Who do I want to be for others? Who am I for God? All these questions lead us back to the heart.

Who was St. Valentine? Do our Valentine's Day traditions of love and romance have anything to do with the actual St. Valentine?

There were actually three St. Valentines. One was a priest who was beheaded in Rome on February 14 in the year 269. Another was a bishop, who was also martyred in the third century. Both are buried on the Appian Way in Rome. The third St. Valentine is a lesser-known saint who died in Africa with a number of companions during the early centuries of the Church. The tomb of this St. Valentine became a center of popular devotion in the early Middle Ages. In 496, Pope Gelasius set aside February 14 to honor this particular St. Valentine.

The popular romantic customs that surround our present Valentine's Day trace their origins back to the Middle Ages. The English writer Geoffrey Chaucer noted that halfway through the second month of the year, February 14, the birds begin to choose their mates. For this reason, the day was looked upon as specially consecrated to lovers and as a proper occasion for writing love letters and sending lovers' tokens. People who gave or received these tokens or letters were referred to as "valentines." In the Middle Ages, a legend also developed that St. Valentine the priest left a farewell note for his jailer's daughter, who had become his friend, and that he signed that note "From Your Valentine."
