- Witnesses: The final chapters of the Book of Isaiah are filled with apocalyptic images of what the 'end of times' will be like. Every nation and language Tarshish = Spain; Put and Lud = North Africa; Tubal and Javan = Asia Minor will be gathered to Jerusalem. But this will first require God to 'set a sign among them'. God requires missionaries to witness to God's ways. Do you recognise your call to being God's love and representative among your peers? What would be your biggest challenge? Fear? Who is a good witness / role model (sign) of faith for you? How could you imitate them?
- ❖ <u>Discipleship and Discipline</u>: The Letter to the Hebrews was written for and sent to Jewish Christians facing persecution in the years leading up to 70 AD. Many were struggling with persecution and facing trials from Jewish religious leaders, for their belief in Jesus. They were frustrated that Jesus had not 'returned' as quickly as they had hoped. They are downcast with drooping hands and weak knees! They are invited to see struggles and trials as 'discipline' which comes from the word disciple which in turn comes from the word to learn and be educated. What is one struggle you are having currently? What is it teaching you?
- ❖ A Few or Many Saved? Jesus is on his way to Jerusalem and he challenges all who have a conversation with him about getting ready for the 'end of time'. Jewish people assumed they were the 'few', and sinners, unclean people, unbelievers were the 'many' who would not be saved. This sparks the question: will only a few people be saved? Jesus does not answer the question directly but presents an image: a crowd is trying to get into a house but all must go through a narrow door. There will come a time when the door will be closed and people are left outside. If this scene was really going to happen, how could you be prepared? How do you get to the front of the crowd and close to the door?
- Shocked and Surprised: Jewish people believed they had a special status, as chosen by God. They presumed this also meant they had a special 'entry permit' through the door. 'We ate and drank with you, you taught us!' They are completely surprised at the possibility that other people sinners! could get into heaven ahead of them. A modern day Catholic response could be: 'But I have listened to the Gospel stories on Sunday and have shared in the Eucharist with you!'. Jesus challenges us: it is not enough to 'be there' on Sunday; we are called to 'do something' on Monday ... to be a sign of God's forgiveness ... to become a living image of Jesus, following his lifestyle daily and shaping the world into becoming one family. How could you take further concrete steps from Sunday worship to Monday witness?

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Pilgrims of Hope — A reflection offered by John P Murray osa

On 16th August, 88 of our community went on pilgrimage to Ayutthaya, the home of the Kings of Siam and the birthplace of the Catholic Church in Thailand and beyond.

In the 1560s, Portuguese Dominicans were the first to come to these shores, in order to minister to the Portuguese Catholics living in Ayutthaya. 100 years later, French missionaries were sent by Rome to new lands, in China and present-day Vietnam. In Ayutthaya, thanks to a king who offered hospitality, these missionaries to strange and foreign lands found a home and base. Here, they founded the first church of the Siamese Mission, in 1669. This makes Ayutthaya a special place — a holy place — in the history of the Church in this region.

We set off as simple, humble pilgrims, returning enriched and nourished in body, mind and soul. What made this the special day that it was?

- It was not because of any one person. Rather it was because of all of us, because of who we are together. Together we learnt, we prayed, we shared, we enjoyed.
- It was being present to history on holy ground, for here holy men and women came and laboured for the Church and the Gospel.
- It was the simple human experience of the day, seeing people's faces light up with wonder, hearing and feeling the sincere and deep prayers of our fellow pilgrims, enjoying the simple moments of sharing with people together, enjoying the hospitality along the way.
- It was knowing that together we stood as Church, not alone, but with the whole Church, past and present. In Church, we hold a treasure, the treasure of 2,000 years of life and mission, following the Gospel and showing God's love and care. There we could sense this treasure, because of the great men and women of Church, who had gone before us on this very spot.

On a personal note, at times during the day, I did feel somewhat inadequate, thinking "Who am I?" Then I reminded myself that this is not about me, but about us together. Here and now, on this journey, we hold each other up in faith, knowing that who we are as pilgrims is defined by us together, before our God.

Is this not a reflection on life? It is made worthwhile by our living together, showing love and care to our world. In such a way, the knowledge of God is deepened in a world that so needs to know God. This is our mission. As **Pilgrims of Hope** in our world, I pray that we ever know as much excitement and joy as that little boy beside me, during lunch that day, whose face lit up when he saw a boat go down the river. His enthusiasm arose at seeing something so simple. His enthusiasm was so natural, so human, so life-giving. *That* was my special gift.

My wife mentioned that neither the Book of Mormon nor the Catholic Bible mentions purgatory. Please comment.

A not-uncommon frustration is when a person searches the Bible for a particular word or phrasing. Frankly, it is expecting too much from the religious text to be able to faithfully record a particular word or phrase that originated hundreds of years after the ancient text was composed. Purgatory is one such example of this frustration. The concept of purgatory is referenced in the biblical text, particularly in 2 Corinthians 5:10 and 7:1, Hebrews 9:27 and 12:14, and 2 Maccabees 12:46, but the word is never used.

This should come as no real surprise because it was not until the writings of St. Thomas Aguinas (1225-1274) that the concept was expanded and formed into a theological statement of belief that has become central to Roman Catholicism. And what is that belief? The Catechism of the Catholic Church is clear: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. The Church gives the name purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned" (CCC, 1030, 1031a). The Book of Mormon never references purgatory, but it does speak about the afterlife and the experience of "waiting" in the spirit world for the completion of earthly time. •
