LIVINGTHEWORD

- Leprosy Loneliness: Our readings today have 2 characters who suffer from leprosy. Lepers were excluded from living in the community. People didn't want to catch the disease. It was also commonly believed that leprosy was a sign of being punished by God and that the leper was both morally and ritually unclean. The forced isolated, shunned life living outside the community (Lev 13:46) caused incredible loneliness and constant rejection. How do we shun, isolate and cause chronic loneliness and rejection for people today? What are some modern forms of social leprosy?
- Courageous Healing: Naaman was a general in the Syrian Army, both a foreigner and an enemy, and he had leprosy so was excluded and to be feared. Israel and Syria were not friendly. Possibly from a previous conquest, Naaman had even taken a Jewish slave girl for his household. Everyone would have been against him! Consider the courage he had in going to a holy man, called Elisha, in Israel. Consider all the obstacles Namaan had to overcome for healing? What obstacles do you need to step through toward healing and courageous asking for help?
- Challenging Exclusion: Scholars suggest that St Paul's letter to Timothy was written while he was in prison. St Paul was 'in chains', treated as a criminal for preaching the Gospel of inclusion by God, in Christ, to the Gentiles. He invites young Timothy to also be willing to persevere and suffer for this mission. What would you be willing to endure the hardship or damaging reputation of chains for? Jesus and Paul challenge the patterns of exclusion in our community and society. How could you reach out to include someone feeling excluded, in your family or workplace?
- ❖ Giving Thanks: Gospel stories are like icebergs 90% of the story is beneath the surface. Underneath the story of the lepers are further stories of exclusion, hurt and isolation. The Samaritan is like Naaman in the first reading: a hated foreigner. Events in the past meant Samaritans no longer acknowledged Jerusalem and the Temple as the place of true worship. Healing from leprosy required a certificate of health by the priest before a leper could be accepted back into the community. The 9 lepers are obviously so keen to see the priest that they lost sight of who did the healing − Jesus. Only the foreigner stopped and showed gratitude. When do you take your life and health for granted? Have you had some high moments and forgotten to give thanks to God? Write, share or pray a 'thank-you-list' to God, about things in life you forget to say thanks to God for.
- Including or Excluding? God wishes to include and bring to faith the most unlikely of characters. Naaman and the Samaritan leper show God's desire to include, not exclude. What does this teach us about God? Does it change your image of God? Which unlikely character in your community might God be inviting you to bring to faith? What misconceptions do you have, and need to let go of, so that God's welcome and inclusion can be realised?

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Pope Leo gave his first major interview in July, extracts of which were published by Crux on the occasion of his 70th birthday. He was speaking with journalist Elise Ann Allen.

With regard to efforts to promote peace, Pope Leo, referring to the war in Ukraine, repeated that "peace is the only answer." "The useless killing, after all these years, of people on both sides – in that particular conflict, but also in other conflicts – I think people have to somehow be awakened to say, *there's another way to do this!*"

He continued, "We keep hoping. I believe strongly that we cannot give up hope, *ever*." While acknowledging the reality of "bad actors" and "temptations," Pope Leo says it is nonetheless possible "to encourage people to look at higher values, the real values, that make a difference. ... You can have hope, and you keep trying to push and say to people, 'Let's do this in a different way.'" He, therefore, calls for "dialogue".

For Pope Leo, it is important "to continue to remind ourselves of the potential that humanity has to overcome the violence and the hatred that is just dividing us more and more." Recognising that we live in times of polarisation and also in times of lost values, Pope Leo said: "The value of human life, of the family, and the value of society ... if we lose the sense of those values, what matters anymore?"

He also pointed to "the continuously wider gap between the income levels of the working class and the money that the wealthiest receive." The Pope notes that "CEOs that 60 years ago might have been making four to six times more than what the workers are receiving, the last figure I saw, it's 6,600 times more than what average workers are receiving." On this point, the Pope says he also read that Elon Musk will be the world's first trillionaire: "What does that mean and what's that about? If that is the only thing that has value anymore, then we're in big trouble..."

Pope Leo XIV spoke on the concept of synodality, which, he says, "means each and every member of the Church has a voice and a role to play through prayer ... reflection ... through a process." "Some people have felt threatened by that," the Pope says. "I think that synodality is a way of describing how we can come together, be a community, and seek communion as a Church, so that it's a Church whose primary focus is *not* on an institutional hierarchy, but rather on a sense of 'we together', 'our Church'."

He reflects that this is an attitude that can "teach a lot to the world today." It is not about trying to transform the Church into some kind of democratic government." Instead, it is about "respecting and understanding the life of the Church for what it is and saying, *'We have to do this together.*"

Are people born with the Holy Spirit, or do they have to be baptized in order to receive the Holy Spirit? If we are not born with the Holy Spirit, is it just our conscience that is bothered when we are doing wrong?

Your question is suggesting that the Holy Spirit is "in" or "out." St. Paul teaches us, "In him we live and move and have our being" (Acts 17:28). In other words, the Spirit of God is always with us, and we are dependent on that Spirit for life. There is no beginning and there is no end; the Spirit always was, and is, and will be.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains that "Conscience is a judgment of reason whereby the human person recognizes the moral quality of a concrete act that he is going to perform, is in the process of performing, or has already completed. In all he says and does, man is obliged to follow faithfully what he knows to be just and right" (1778). We have an obligation to form our consciences to know what is right and to help our children form theirs. It is with the cooperation of the Spirit that a "good conscience" is formed.

When we celebrate the sacraments, including the sacrament of baptism, we are confirming the life of the Spirit that is within is. We are acknowledging and proclaiming the abiding presence of the Spirit of God. •
